The New Vaudeville.

The people of Yakima are showing their appreciation of the Petit Edison Theatre by patronizing it in large numbers. This week the team is Layne and d'Agrea, in a sketch called "Mistaken Identity." It is one of the cleverest sketches seen on the vaudeville stage, and entirely out of the ordinary run of comedy parts. It must be seen to be appreciated. Prof. Sidney Barker gives a pleasing selection on the zither. The animated pictures are ably projected and lectured upon by Prof. James Miller. One of the features of the entertainment is the illustrated song, "Pictures of Days Gone By," ably rendered by W. John Vansickle, a local singer of repute. The patronage of the Edison is going up by leaps and bounds, and is deserving a place in the hearts of Yakima society.

Yakima Markets.

Very little new matters have arisen in the produce markets since last reports. No fruit is coming in in any quantity but winter apples, peaches, grapes, etc., having about become things of the past for the season. There is only small demand for choice Grimes' Golden, Spitzenburg and Jonathan apples at \$1.25 per box, other varieties being discounted.

Potatoes are in a rut at \$10 and \$12 per ton, and alfalfa still stands at about \$10 per ton baled. All the surplus grain hay and timothy has been marketed.

Hops have taken a tumble to 22 and 23 cents for choice, for no accountable reason save that brewers are resting easy on the delivery of their contracts. No sales of importance are reported.

May Put in Athletic Rooms.

Chris. Larson, the well known and popular wrestler, is thinking strongly of starting an athletic association in this city. He is now feeling the pulse of the citizens and business men and if sufficient encouragement is given the scheme it will be launched at once. Mr. Larson says it will cost in the neighborhood of \$1000 to fit up rooms with proper paraphernalia, baths, etc., and he does not feel inclined to take hold of the matter unless there will be sufficient financial backing to assure it success. His idea is to secure not less than 200 members, among those who are admirers of clean, wholesome athletics, charge an admission fee of \$5 and place the monthly dues at \$2. In return the members will receive instructions in boxing, wrestling, tumbling, aerial work and physical culture and have free access to the baths and reading rooms.

In the absence of a Y. M. C. A., or gymnasium of any sort in the city it would seem that the scheme is feasible and Mr. Larson the proper person to take hold of the matter.
